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Multiple Choice Exams

- Read the question first. Try to answer it yourself.
- Read all choices one by one then decide. Use key words.
- In social sciences: qualifiers are usually the correct response. Examples: "however", "but", "in certain cases", etc.
- In sciences: absolutes are usually correct. Example: boiling temperature of water.
- Flow: don't get stuck on questions; move along and come back later.
- When you return to what you skipped, figure out which answer is impossible.
- Cross out distractors that are wrong.
 Clear your field of vision.

- Responses that look like the word in the question are usually incorrect.
 Example: allusion, illusion, illustration.
- Similar distractors: are they really similar? Key word(s) may make the difference. If they both say the same thing, they are usually incorrect.
- Guessing: the first "gut" impression –
 longest, most precise answer answer
 that is in the middle.
- **Similar answers:** check for key words in the question and the answers.
- Check your exam before handing it in (e.g. response sheet).
